assimilation:

- name of plan to make Native Americans part of white culture

coup:

- an act of bravery performed in battle

longhorn:

- sturdy cattle accustomed to dry grassland

long drive:

- three-month long overland transport of cattle



Discovery of gold in Colorado

It drew tens of thousands of miners to the region and replaced unspoiled landscapes with filthy, ramshackle settlements.



Sand Creek Massacre



More than 150 Cheyenne were killed, mostly women and children.



Treaty of Fort Laramie

The Sioux were forced to live on a reservation along the Missouri River. But Native Americans resisted the restrictions placed on them.



Invasion by gold miners of Sioux's sacred Black Hills



Led to violent conflict between the natives and the miners



Custer's Last Stand

Cheyenne and Sioux warriors killed Custer and all the men of the Seventh Cavalry.



Assimilation formalized in the Dawes Act

to "Americanize" Native Americans and make them become farmers



The spread of the Ghost Dance movement

the Battle of Wounded Knee

The Seventh Cavalry slaughtered 300 unarmed Native Americans.
